

Why Study Global Studies at Azusa Pacific University?

The global studies major includes dynamic, unfolding, and individualized sets of learning experiences—some occurring within a formal classroom environment and others within domestic and international field settings. The multicultural learning of LA Term, for instance, paves the way for the international, intercultural learning experiences highlighted in the Global Learning Term. Students serve in an internship at home and abroad and discover how regional realities are shaped by broader demographic, political, economic, and cultural systems that operate at regional, national, and global levels.

The mission of the global studies program is to attract and develop an exceptional group of world learners through a unique combination of individualized mentoring, multidisciplinary coursework, intercultural fieldwork, and compassionate action. The aim is to equip students with the global knowledge, intercultural grace, practical learning skills, and moral imagination to support vocations dedicated to promoting God's truth and justice in the world.

The curriculum balances traditional learning in the classroom with experiential learning in the world. Rather than anchor learning solely in textbooks, students are given ample opportunity to field-test what they learn by engaging experientially in ever-changing contemporary reality. In other words, the written text is juxtaposed with living texts.

OPTIONS TO EXPLORE AROUND APU

BE CALLED.

EXPLORE. DEFINE. RESEARCH. LEARN.

- ENROLL IN GLOBAL ISSUES & PROSPECTS (GLBL 120)
 Explore the key concepts in global studies, as well as the trends and issues affecting global communities.
- TAKE ANTHROPOLOGY FOR EVERYDAY LIFE (GLBL 301)
 Encounter and understand human differences within local communities through the combined study of topics in applied anthropology and the development of cross-cultural relationships.

SECURE AN INTERNSHIP

Global studies students complete two pre-professional internships—Los Angeles internship experiences in Community Transformation (GLBL 330), and International Internship (GLBL335). Both internships involve academic work that simultaneously builds up world understanding and benefits local communities.

- CARRY OUT SMALL-SCALE RESEARCH PROJECTS
 - Employers want what the global studies major seeks to develop: students who can think critically, communicate clearly, relate to others across deep differences, make ethical judgments on complex subjects, and apply global knowledge to stubborn problems. Throughout the program, students complete self-directed field research on pressing community issues under the apprenticeship of local experts.
- INTERGRATE YOUR GLOBAL LEARNING EXPERIENCES

Integration and Formation Seminar (GLBL 425) and Sustainable Societies (GLBL 420) guide students in examining *self* in relation to *society* as a basis for crafting personal lifestyle and vocational *responses*. The integration process asks the question: "How do I become the change I want to see in the world?"

PREPARE YOUR PORTFOLIO

Global studies majors collect select academic products into an individualized digital folder that highlights and showcases students' major experiences and accomplishments. The portfolio becomes a professional resource for students.

- CREATE A RESUME TO APPLY FOR AN INTERNSHIP
 Meet with a Career Consultant* to review your resume and cover

Do informational interviews or go to a career-related event to learn more about your career, degree, and experience requirements.

- MAKE MULTICULTURAL AND INTERNATIONAL CONNECTIONS WITH APU STUDENTS

APPLY.

□ APPLICATION FORM AND FEES

Follow instructions carefully and have one or more people check for errors.

☐ ENTRANCE ESSAY

Provide a writing example that shows your personal objectives.

□ TRANSCRIPT

Ask APU to send it directly to the school you are applying to.

□ LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Schools usually require three letters, so get them early.

□ INTERVIEWS

If your potential school requests an interview, treat it as a job interview.
