

Why Study **Spanish** at Azusa Pacific University?

Spanish is one of the most spoken languages in the world, and Los Angeles is one of the world's largest Spanish-speaking cities. There is a growing need for people with linguistic and cultural skills to work in increasingly globalized communities. Indeed, a recent study stated that bilingual speakers earn 10-15% more than those who only speak English. The Spanish program is designed to fill this need. It works well as a double-major, with low unit requirements and high compatibility with many career paths. It equips businessmen, health care professionals, community workers, journalists—in short, anyone interested in other cultures—to thrive in the diversity of our planet.

The Spanish major at Azusa Pacific University offers opportunities to serve in local Spanish-speaking communities, through internships and hands-on coursework, or to go abroad, through international programs in Costa Rica, Ecuador, and Spain.

OPTIONS TO EXPLORE AROUND APU

BE CALLED.

 Learn in an environment geared toward real-life situations. Develop basic listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills.

 Register for an internship locally or abroad in SPAN 494
 (Internship). Students may work in hospitals, libraries, schools, or
 TV networks.
- ENGAGE IN A CROSS-CULTURAL EXPERIENCE
 The Costa Rica Study Abroad program matches students according to their career goals with local businesses and organizations, or check out other APU Study Abroad options.
- IF YOU'RE INTERESTED IN GRADUATE-LEVEL EDUCATION
 Seek advice from professors in the Department of Modern
 Languages.

- RECEIVE FEEDBACK ON YOUR INTERVIEWING ABILITIES Complete a Mock Interview with a Career Consultant*

Students have the opportunity to engage with other students, professors, and professionals who are passionate about Spanish language and culture. Opportunities include the Latin American Student Association, International Chapel, DML Spanish Colloquia, and the Bruce-Novoa Series on Chicano/Latino Experience.

APPLY.

□ APPLICATION FORM AND FEES

Follow instructions carefully and have one or more people check for errors.

☐ ENTRANCE ESSAY

Provide a writing example that shows your personal objectives.

□ TRANSCRIPT

Ask APU to send it directly to the school you are applying to.

□ LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Schools usually require three letters, so get them early.

□ INTERVIEWS

If your potential school requests an interview, treat it as a job interview.

FINDING YOUR CAREER

- Regularly check-in with your organizations of interest and network with those who can inform you of opportunities
