



Three Important Financial Aid Rules

(which may impact a student's Academic Plan and Financial Aid)

Rule 1: Dropping/Withdrawing from Classes. If a student is planning on dropping or withdrawing from any of their classes within a term/session, the student must contact their assigned student account counselor immediately as it may result in a delay, revision of their financial aid, or an owing balance.

- Federal Direct Loans are given to students while they are enrolled in courses, therefore if they completely drop/withdraw from all courses, funds may be adjusted potentially creating an owing balance.
- If a student drops/withdraws from partial units, it may cause a small revision to their financial aid, but it is still important for students to maintain an open dialogue with their Student Account Counselor.

Rule 2: Taking Courses within a Program and Understanding Half-Time Limits.

Students must take courses within the program they are enrolled in and be sure that they are enrolled in at least half-time units for the program to be eligible for Federal Financial Aid.

Credential or certain Certificate Only: 6 units per term, including summer

Masters: 5 units per term, 3 units for summer

Half Time = M.A. in Clinical Psychology: 4 units per term, 3 units in summer

M.S. in Nursing: 3 units per term

<u>Doctor of Ministry</u>: 4 units per term, all other Doctoral Degrees are 3 units per term.

- If a student is enrolled in multiple programs, they will receive financial aid based on the program they are enrolled in at least half-time.
- Change of programs can mean different unit load requirements and financial aid eligibility.
- Students cannot receive financial aid for courses taken outside of their program in order to meet half-time unit requirements; they must be in courses within their program.

Rule 3: Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP). Satisfactory academic progress for students is measured in three ways: qualitative, quantitative and maximum time frame for their program. If a student fails to meet any one of these criteria, they will not be eligible for federal financial aid.

- Qualitative: A student must maintain a minimum grade-point average or at least 3.0. Students with exceptions are in the following programs- Master of Divinity, Master of Pastoral Studies, and Master of Youth Ministry which have a 2.7 minimum cumulative GPA requirement.
- Quantitative: Student must complete 67 percent of all units.
- Maximum Time Frame: Every program has a maximum time frame for completing the program. Students can only receive aid within the time limits established for their program. This starts from the date of initial enrollment in a program:
 - o **5 years:** School of Business and Management degrees, School Counseling, Psychology and School of Education.
 - o 10 years: Master in Divinity.
 - o **8 years:** for all other master's and doctoral degrees.
 - Credential/Certificate programs: measured at 150 percent of the total units within the program. Repeated or attempted courses will count towards the time limits.
