





Prepositions

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Prepositions are words like at, by, from, in, of, on, to, with, and beneath that typically come before a noun (or pronoun) to show how the noun relates to something else. For example:

The mouse ran under the table. Under shows the relationship between *the table* and *ran*.

<p>Go <u>through</u> the first traffic light.</p> <p>Turn left <u>at</u> the second traffic light.</p> <p>We went <u>over</u> the bridge.</p> <p>Go <u>around</u> the house to the backyard.</p> <p>I turned <u>to</u> the right.</p>	<p>Why don't we meet <u>at</u> the coffee shop?</p> <p>I put the pencil <u>on</u> the desk.</p> <p>He is standing <u>next to</u> the fountain. (beside)</p> <p>The boy hid <u>in</u> the pantry.</p> <p>She went <u>to</u> the store.</p>
