Hello, my name is Linny.

This life I have walked in can only be explained by the wonder that is our God. God loves more in a moment than anyone could in a lifetime. I think as far back as I can remember, I would cry out "Oh, God" and each time I would think He wasn't listening. And now I see that He answered a hundred times in my one cry with: "I am here." It took me four long, hard, and yet wonderful undergraduate years to see Him for the love that He is.

I grew up with a childhood that led into my later years, with absolute brokenness. From the moment that I was born, I walked forth into a city holding on to nothing but the hand of my broken and addicted 16-year-old mother. I grew up homeless and slept on the edge of buildings and street corners, collecting scraps here and there. The memories never leave my head and at a young age, you would think a kid couldn't remember anything, but they can.

Both my biological mom and dad abused drugs, alcohol, themselves and then me. I grew up with physical and emotional scars from a traumatic

childhood and later years in the foster care system. I was in a total of 14 foster homes. I had 14 temporary mommies and daddies, as I called them. At a young age, part of the light that was left in me, felt gone. My memories, harsh as they were, were the only things in those times that sustained me. Eleven of those years consisted of physical and emotional abuse I received from a woman I will leave unnamed. It was a terrifying thing to have to seek safety in other people, for home to be wherever you lay your head. To belong to no one, and yet, belong to everyone.

In these last four years at APU, through loving words and actions, empowering prayers, and encouragement, I have come to see that I am loved in a world where I did not feel loved. That every person I meet is my family, in a life in which family did not exist for me.

On a 10-day trip through the wilderness for Resident Advisors this past summer, I saw a group of strangers come together, carry each other's weight up and down those mountains, and become a family. And out there, amidst the stillness of Yosemite with my Walkabout Team, APU became my home.

I saw God's plan for me in Mexico when I was able to serve as an interpreter and allow God to use my voice to communicate for Him for my team, to serve a facility that took care of abandoned elderly men. Every word that was translated and used to communicate between two languages, affirmed my identity in Christ as a servant.

If it wasn't for the unending love and support I have received during my time here at Azusa Pacific University, I would not be where I am. I only have a heart full of gratefulness. Because of scholarships and God's mercy, I am that 3% of foster children that attend college nationwide and graduate in the end. I am that 3% that is going to walk across that stage and become a teacher.

I have had so many opportunities at APU to witness the beauty that life is. I came here to seek God's true love and guidance and to be equipped with the right tools to become an educator and make the difference in students' lives. After graduation, I plan to enter a graduate program here at APU and receive my Masters in Education along with my Secondary Teaching Credential. I plan to be a high school history teacher, with the hopes of also being a part of film societies that host film festivals for students wanting to go into the arts. My time and journey here at Azusa Pacific has helped me find my voice, my place in this world.

Looking back, I am in awe. I saved up all of the money I had in a piggy bank, back in my senior year of high school, and purchased a Greyhound ticket, jumped on an Amtrak, took several buses, and walked the rest of the way to APU to visit the campus. I am in awe of the plan that God had for me. He was bringing me home.


