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Emerging Research Trends... Multidisciplinary Research

Tremendous research advances have been achieved the past few centuries as researchers deconstructed our world into smaller and smaller units, thus leading to the ascendance of specialized or single-discipline research.¹ A growing recognition over the past 40 years, however, of the complexities of modern societies and interconnectedness among people everywhere has engendered research approaches that are decidedly multidisciplinary.

The allure of multidisciplinary research, also referred to as interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary research, is its promise to solve practical and often complex problems because it is not limited by discipline boundaries. Indeed, in a 2014 study discussed in Times Higher Education, academicians cited multidisciplinary projects by a four to one margin when asked to identify research that made substantial impact outside academia.² Society and the physical world are by nature complex and often intertwined. Practical problems are complicated, so their solutions typically require multiple perspectives. For instance, biology, psychology, sociology, social work, communication studies, and history, to name just a few, all speak into developing strategies to cope with problems faced by aging populations in modern societies.

To be sure, some remain wary of multidisciplinary trends. Ian Goldwin, Professor of Globalisation and Development at Oxford University's Oxford Martin School suggests in a provocatively titled article, *Multidisciplinary Research 'Career Suicide' for Junior Academics*, that multidisciplinary research still struggles to gain widespread traction and implies it is reduced to being just a buzzword.³ Goldwin asserts that research councils, and by implication, sources of research funding, shy away from multidisciplinary projects because of uncertainties in evaluating the authenticity of leadership and the innovativeness of such projects. This uncertainty is mimicked by leading journal editorial boards, resulting in few truly multidisciplinary studies being published in top-tier journals. Since leading journals are still dominated by a discipline-specific focus, Goldwin encourages young academicians to master a specialized field before pursuing multidisciplinary endeavors. So, which will prevail? Single- or multidisciplinary approaches? No doubt, it is both, with the recognition they often reinforce each other. *(Article continued on Page 4)*

Faculty Spotlight

Dr. Rachel Castaneda joined APU as an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology in 2011. Her research is focused on recovery from substance use specifically taking a developmental social approach. She also leads the Faith Integrated SBIRT Network as part of a SAMHSA federal grant alongside with Dr. Mary Rawlings (Social Work) and Dr. Sheryl Tyson (Nursing). As affiliated scholar in the Integrated Substance Abuse Programs within the Department of



Medicine and Public Health at UCLA, Dr. Castaneda has recently been involved in a number of evaluations for adolescent programs. We asked her a few questions to find out more about her motivation and success:

<u>*ORG*</u>: How did you get started down the path of a research scholar? What led you in that direction to start with? <u>*RC*</u>: Mentors at UCLA played a significant role in engaging me in a path towards research and scholarship.

<u>*ORG*</u>: What continues to motivate you as a researcher? That is, why do you continue doing what you have been doing? <u>*RC*</u>: I have a deep-seated desire to create change among youth in local communities challenged by substance use issues.

<u>*ORG*</u>: You have been so successful in acquiring research-related grants, contracts, and sub-awards. Why is that? How do you explain it? <u>*RC*</u>: I am privileged to have had very strong research mentors. These mentors have continued to come alongside me in partnerships and collaborations even after I left their immediate group and began branching out in my career.

<u>ORG</u>: Do you find it difficult to manage time demands between research, other academic duties, such as writing grants, publishing papers, going to conferences, etc.? What one or two tips might you give to up and coming researchers in this area? <u>RC</u>: It takes commitment - so building in time each week that is dedicated to writing is key. It also takes good partnerships, mentors, and collaborators who will invest in the work as well; building in time to foster and facilitate relationships is important.

<u>ORG</u>: All successful researchers also encounter failures. Has this happened to you? If so, how did you feel? How do you respond to rejection? <u>RC</u>: Yes, it's part of the process. I view the manuscript and grant reviews/critiques as critical agents that serve as feedback to help strengthen the resubmission instead of considering such critiques as rejection or failure.

<u>ORG</u>: Collaboration is big these days in the world of research and grants. Can you share a little bit about the collaborative efforts between psychology, social work and nursing at APU under one of your grants? <u>RC</u>: This is the *Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) Training Initiative among....* (continued on Page 4)

... Allied Health Professional Disciplines at Faith-Based Colleges project. It's been an exciting endeavor. Mary Rawlings, BAS Department of Social Work, and Sheryl Tyson, School of Nursing, are strong scholars who also have deep convictions for using research to support community change and improve practices within our respective fields. This project is also a collaboration with UCLA, who has been a tremendous partner to our multidisciplinary project effort at APU.

<u>*ORG*</u>: In looking back at your research, what accomplishment(s) brings you the most satisfaction, and why? <u>*RC*</u>: I am especially enthusiastic about building evidence-based programs and interventions that young people readily embrace which serve to improve the system of care for youth and families impacted by substance use disorders.

<u>*ORG*</u>: What advice would you offer those entering academics who dream of having a career just like that of Dr. Rachel Castaneda? <u>*RC*</u>: They should strive to be active learners and committed scholars who continually seek to build effective partnerships and relations.

When physicists first discovered X-rays (1895) and gamma-radiation (1900), the enormous benefits to many areas of health science over the ensuing century was hardly imaginable. Indeed, discoveries from specialized disciplines can be especially transformative when applied in multidisciplinary environments, so distinctions in advantages of single- versus multidisciplinary approaches are blurred.¹

APU researchers should take note of funding opportunities that emphasize multidisciplinary approaches. The John Templeton Foundation (www.templeton.org), for example, emphasizes input from natural and social sciences along with theology and philosophy in many of its core funding areas. Indeed, the Character Virtue Development subsection of the Templeton core states, "We support a broad range of programs whether understood from a scientific, philosophical, or religious point of view."

Multidisciplinary funding opportunities are evident in many other foundation calls for proposals, but they also come from federal programs, often in spurts. Over the past years, NIH has encouraged projects that blend humanities and medical science, social media technology and health, and a variety of alternative methodologies to use in health care. These include music therapy and spiritual and psychological effects on health. In fact, even as this report was being drafted, we noticed two recent NIH R01/R21 opportunities titled *Addressing Health Disparities through Effective Interventions among Immigrant Populations* prompting collaborations from experts in education, environmental science, and health. NSF also promotes special multidisciplinary programs and dedicates a section of its website to information on multidisciplinary opportunities through NSF (https://www.nsf.gov/od/oia/additional_resources/interdisciplinary_research/).

An exciting example of a multidisciplinary undertaking among APU faculty is the *Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) Training Initiative among Allied Health Professional Disciplines at Faith-Based Colleges* project. In 2015, APU received an award of \$936,000 from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) in the DHHS to be used over three years. The SBIRT project, mentioned in the above Faculty Spotlight, illustrates how convergence of diverse disciplines can help address complex issues. This project enhances psychology, social work, and nursing curricular components within faith-based institutions to prepare those who will work with patients at risk for substance use disorders.
