Moving to the Center? Think CREV!

The provost's Scholarship Cornerstone at APU is pursued many ways, including through campus centers of excellence. High in the centers' echelons is CREV, the Center for Research on Ethics and Values, directed by Dr. Mark Eaton. While CREV engages faculty in scholarship through special events as it did in cosponsoring the David C. Bicker Communication Ethics Conference this past February, CREV is also the Office of Research and Grants (ORG) unit by which APU provides fellowships to advance scholarship that applies ethical principles and promotes beneficent human values. The CREV faculty fellowships amount to one or two course releases for up to three persons each year, and the highly desirable Beverley Hardcastle Stanford Fellowship provides one semester release from all teaching for one faculty. A call for applications goes out each fall for projects that would be developed in the following academic year. Fellowship competitions for 2015-16 and 2016-17 were intense. Science & Religion Club Discussions

This past year, CREV facilitated other novel activities and events on campus. Of particular interest was the year-long collaboration between CREV and the APU Center for Research in Science (CRIS) resulting in student-led Science & Religion discussions following each of the nine lectures given through the CRIS speaker series themed around "Science in Service". Speakers for this series included Dr. Walter Bradley, Baylor University, and Dr. Jeffrey Greenberg, Wheaton College. Small groups of 4-6 students participated in discussions around the feasibility and ethics of applying science and technology to address poverty and economic depression around the world. The discussions were driven by probing lectures in the series with titles like *Do Missionaries Wear Lab Coats?*, *Science and Technology in Service of the Poor, Design in the Developing World*, and *Breaking the Circle of Poverty in Nepal*.

Special Events around Darwin

Through Dr. Eaton's leadership, CREV also hosted two intriguing events around the legacy of Charles Darwin. In late spring, Edward J. Larson, Pepperdine University, lectured on Darwin and the Victorian Soul. A week later, CREV hosted a single performance of the one-person play, Mr. Darwin's Tree, in APU's Black Box Theatre. This award-winning play is produced by Scholarship & Christianity in Oxford (SCIO), the UK Centre of the Council for Christian Colleges & Universities (CCCU) and underwritten by the Templeton Religion Trust. To be sure, these Darwin-themed events did not address scientific merits of evolution. Instead, they explored the life of Darwin, his work, his interactions with contemporaries, and the impact his ideas had on his day and thereafter. Mr. Darwin's Tree provided keen insight as to Darwin's thoughts on religion and how leading religious figures of his days responded to his ideas. There were ample opportunities to consider how the interface of science and faith might work out in the three-person panel discussion after the play that included Dr. Sarah Richart, APU professor of biology, Dr. Eaton, and author of the play, Murray Watt.

Kudos to Dr. Eaton for the thoughtful activities initiated and sponsored by CREV in 2015-16. Congratulations to those faculty who worked on CREV fellowship awards last year and those receiving awards for 2016-17.

Association), WPA (Western Psychological Association), and SAS Analytics conference. Undoubtedly, these experiences kindled my passion for the academic elements of psychology, the continuum of pain and pleasure of learning, designing, and implementing research projects. Giving thanks to God, who has allowed me to harvest the fruits of those efforts so far, I am awaiting for my last year in APU. When I look back, I can see that God's deliberate fingerprints are found on my every step: I was confronted with cultural barriers, and He breathed hope into me that I am not alone. ... the Associate Athletics Director, Senior Woman Administrator, and Director of Sports Medicine and Wellness. In 2014, April was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame for Meritorious Service related to Athletic Training. She serves in



numerous sports-related committees, both at the university and national levels. During her 18+ years at Azusa Pacific, she has seen significant growth in its sports medicine program, including more than doubling the size of her staff team. Indeed, the APU athletic program is highly respected, and through the work of April and colleagues, it now has one of the leading sports medicine operations in the nation.



April is the APU Principal Investigator on what is one of the most comprehensive national investigations of sport-related concussion (SRC) ever conducted. In collaboration with multiple universities that form the NCAA-DoD Grand

Alliance, April led APU to become part of the Concussion Assessment, Research and Education (CARE) Consortium. This three-year study started in 2015. It will allow scientists to better understand the history of concussions in athletes and investigate correlations between multi-dimensional predictors and outcome variables associated with SRC from neurobiopsychosocial perspectives. APU received a subaward of \$286,610 from the lead CARE member, University of Michigan, to contribute to this national investigation.

April graduated from Azusa Pacific in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. She went on to earn her master's in kinesiology with an emphasis in sports medicine and injury studies from California State University at Long Beach in 1998. After working with the athletic programs at Mt. San Antonio College and California Institute of Technology, April joined the 19-sport program at APU. April is well published and known as a valued presenter at national seminars. Her studies touch on important problem areas that still need resolution, including NAIA guidelines regarding eating disorders, the value model of a college athletic training, and legal issues in athletics such as those associated with concussions and sickle cell. One especially valuable product from April's creative work is a comprehensive policy and procedure manual. This is the first of its kind for APU athletics, with the manual also being used as a model for other institutions.

April, and her husband Brad, were married in 2013 and reside in Placentia. She enjoys working in her flower garden, spending time with her nieces and family, and being involved in their local church.

... has been a question often raised as I completed kindergarten, high school, and it lingers on today. This has always led me to ponder a career. As a young child, I saw myself being many things from a doctor, to a wedding planner, and even a superhero. It is often not until our adult life that we recognize a career that will

enthrall our interest. Personally, I aspire to be a nurse.

My journey through nursing school has been one of the most difficult but rewarding experiences I have had thus far. I will never forget the phone call I got from my dad saying that I had been accepted into APU's nursing program. It has been a journey filled with laughter, tears, coffee addictions, friendship, and growth. I have laughed with my patients, cried with families, and even danced with them. I watched someone take their first breath and even watched someone take their last. I had the opportunity to work with the strongest little fighters and even the opportunity to work with those at the lowest, those without a home. My first all-nighters were pulled during this journey, and I would not have it any other way. I have learned so much about others but most importantly about myself. I will never trade the smell of old coffee in my cup holder, early morning study sessions, a trunk full of 20 pound books, flashcards all over the floor, and highlighted notes.

APU has given me opportunities to improve my skills as a nurse. It was not until my senior year of nursing school that I realized nursing entailed more than being a nurse at the hospital. I met Dr. Constance Brehm during my Community Health rotation, and she opened my eyes to the homeless population in the San Gabriel Valley. Dr. Brehm mentored me and guided my research in the undergraduate research SURE program. During this time, I was able to gain a deeper understanding of the relationship between health and spirituality.

The SURE program at APU paved way for my research to be presented in the 7th International Nursing and Midwifery Student Conference in Spiritual Care 2015, *Spirituality: At the heart of my practice,* in Oslo, Norway. I was able to conduct a presentation and display my poster in Diakonova

University College in front of students, researchers, and professors. There have been, and continue to be, many opportunities to improve as a nurse because of my time in APU, which I am extremely grateful for.
